 Talking through experiences so they are not seen as failures but as steps towards future success.

A pupil at St Mary's would experience Wellbeing through:

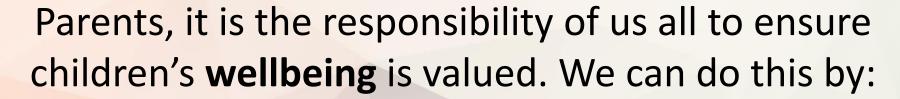
- The kindness and care we show towards each other.

- To make sure you are being respectful to all students and their belongings.



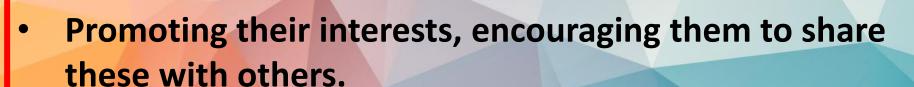








 Support them through any difficulties, such as emotional, friendship or learning.
